The Purpose Clauses (from the NASB):

<u>1Sa 25:21</u> Now David had said, "Surely in vain have I guarded all that this fellow has in the wilderness, <u>so that</u> 1) nothing was missed of all that belonged to him, and 2) he has returned me evil for good. (#1 was their purpose—#2 is the result)

<u>1Sa 24:6</u> So he said to his men, "Far be it from me because of the LORD that I should do this thing to my lord, the LORD'S anointed, <u>to stretch</u> out my hand against him, since he is the LORD'S anointed."

1Sa 25:37 But in the morning, when the wine had gone out of Nabal, his wife told him these things, and his heart died within him so that he became as a stone. (This is result—not Abigail's purpose—but the result is God's purpose—he dies.

Go to the parable Jesus tells in Luke—But God said to him, 'Fool! This night your soul is required of you; and the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' Lu 12:20. I wonder if Jesus had Nabal in mind!)

<u>1Sa 26:19</u> "Now therefore, please let my lord the king listen to the words of his servant. If the LORD has stirred you up against me, let Him accept an offering; but if it is men, cursed are they before the LORD, for they have driven me out today <u>so that</u>

1) I would have no attachment with the inheritance of the LORD, saying, 2) 'Go, serve other gods.' (Notice sometimes there is a dual purpose, or the motive is defined)
