Week 22

1 Kings 17-19, 21; 2 Kings 1-2 The Prophets and Elijah

e are now at a point in the history of Israel and Judah where prophets take on a central role. The greatest of the prophets is Elijah, even though he is not one of the writing prophets. The stature of Elijah is clearly seen in two ways—like Moses, there is no evidence of physical death. He is transported up out of sight by a fiery chariot. Like Moses, he is on the Mount of Transfiguration with Jesus. Moses is the beginning of the Law, and Elijah is the beginning of the era of the prophets. He certainly is not the first prophet, but he is the pre-eminent prophet.
