Nebuchadnezzar. Who is he? What factors shape his life? How is he the instrument of discipline for Israel? How is he himself transformed into what God wants him to be? Nebuchadnezzar was the oldest son of Nabopolassar, who was a proud, rebellious and fierce warrior of the Assyrian Empire.

Many historians and Bible teachers see Nebuchadnezzar only as a prideful and wicked king. Among Jewish scholars he is a hated king, the destroyer of Jerusalem and the Temple. He is all of those things. But there is much more to it. The King that the Lord brings to power for His purposes, are far higher than we can grasp.
